### **PLANT OF THE WEEK : Calibrachoa**



(kali brah KOE ah)

Whether you call them Million Bells, Superbells, Callies or 'those small flowers that look like petunias', calibrachos are 'bloomin' machines' if they're grown well. There are a few things you need to know to have them succeed:

1. **Give them a place in full sun:** shade causes them to grow leggy as they stretch for the light.
2. **Give them a fertile, well-drained soil:** wet soil causes root-rot (the # 1 cause of death),

A common problem is yellowed foliage caused by either pH problems (*soil is too alkaline*), Nitrogen deficiency (*they're relatively heavy feeders and need lots of nitrogen*), root rot or cool temperatures (*a problem in a spring like this one*). Chelated iron can help to green-up yellowed plants.

3. **Keep the soil evenly moist but never over-water.** While plants are drought tolerant in the landscape, in containers they must be kept evenly moist. *We have over 25 varieties of calibrachoa in the greenhouse. Most are trailing varieties but the Mini-Famous and Alohas are compact growers.*

## **GARDEN TIPS: Garden Design**

Years ago, when I was a beginner gardener, I heard a garden commentator say "any fool can grow a good spring garden". At the time I was really proud of my beautiful spring garden and was a bit taken aback by the comment. What he meant is this: there are so many trees, shrubs, perennials and bulbs that bloom in spring that it's easy to create a stunning garden in spring. The challenge is to create a garden that is beautiful summer, fall and even winter. It takes more planning but it's not impossible to do. Even if your plant knowledge is limited, experienced plants-people are more than willing to give you guidance. Gather magazine pictures of gardens or features you like and use them to help you visualize what you would like to achieve in your own garden. Become familiar with your garden area before you impose a design on site. Analyze it to determine its qualities: observe the patterns of sun and shade; look for drainage issues; determine type(s) and condition of soil; assess exposure to heat, frost, and orientation (N, S,

E or W). Familiarize yourself with the hardiness zone of your area. Consider the roles that the landscape will play in your life (play area, entertainment, pets, privacy, etc.) and the problems that your design will have to solve. Then draw up a list of things you'd like to include in your garden space. Armed with this information, you (or a knowledgeable designer) can plan suitable landscape features and choose appropriate plants for the site.

If you are starting with a new landscape, and your resources have been stretched with the building of your home, incorporate items according to the following order:

1. large evergreens, deciduous shade trees, lawns, and hardscape (walls, patios, paths, etc.)
2. evergreen shrubs, ornamental deciduous trees
3. deciduous under-story trees and large shrubs
4. perennials, groundcovers, bulbs, vines
5. annuals

I realize that this is counter-intuitive but it makes sense to plant your 'investment' plants, and install your permanent hardscape, first. As you review this list, you'll see, too, that the items listed first are also ones that contribute winter interest in the garden.

Because spring is considered by many to be the only time to plant (and many people only ever visit a garden centre in spring), spring flowering trees, shrubs and perennials are the ones most often seen in gardens. There are, however, many choices that provide interest through the other months and they're worth searching out. Before purchasing any plants for your garden, determine which will work best for the site:

1. What is the plant's overall form and how will it combine with other plants and fit in the surroundings?
2. What is the plant's branching structure and growth rate, and how will that affect the landscape? in 10 years? in 20 years?
3. Will the foliage contribute to the garden

even when the plant is not in bloom?

**Aim for at least 30 to 50% of plants with interesting foliage to maintain visual interest through the seasons.**

4. When does the plant flower and what colour are the flowers? How will they look in the design?
5. Will the bark add colour and interest during the winter? Are there fruit or berries that will contribute to the winter landscape?
6. Is the plant suited to the site (light, soil, hardiness, and water requirements)?

And remember that the only plants that must be planted in spring are bare-root plants and that container-grown plants can be planted any time through the growing season.
